Vicar's Letter

Recognising this won't be read by most until into 2016 I can't not tell you what has most struck me in the run-up to Christmas 2015: how God was able to disclose his plans and purposes to ordinary people who, without their willing involvement, would never have become so well-known!

I realise it is fashionable to bemoan the rampant secularisation in our society but for many people there is no pantomime nor new film that can beat a traditional nativity - re-telling how Mary and Joseph signed up for a way of life full of hardship; also a group of shepherds, normally regarded as people on the fringe, becoming some of the first people to see and worship the Christ-child and a little time later a bunch of (probably) Persian astrologers who read in the appearance of a new star the unveiling of something special.

All the choices were the result of divine revelation requiring a step of faith and no little disruption to their lives; and all of this happened, as far as we know, outside the pattern and confines of the normal religious activities. This tells me God is very active in the world and people's lives, not just what we can see going on in the life of local Christian churches.

I am not suggesting it is ok to give up on going to church; in fact the Bible expressly says the opposite (eg Hebrews 10v24-25), that abandonment of churchgoing tends to lead to a drift or slippage in terms of the vibrancy of our trust in God. On the other hand I am saying it is arrogant and misguided to suggest that only people who were in church last week could have had a life-enhancing encounter with God. In a nutshell one of the core things Christianity proclaims is how people come into personal contact with God through faith in Jesus, then begin to discover what He wants and how we can play our part in His plan for this world.

Many people know the Christian hymn beginning with the words 'Amazing grace how sweet the sound that saved a wretch like me ...' To be honest I don't like or agree with the sentiment that I am 'a wretch'; but I do know that often it is a sense of conviction of our need of what God can offer which is an early sign that He is on our case!

What many forget or have never been told is this: the hymn's author was a man called John Newton, an infamous slave-trader in the 18th century, who following his conversion to Christianity became a leading advocate and influencer for change leading to the eventual abolition of slavery. He is just one example of what can happen when we start to pay attention to the approaches of God to us: He wants to change the world around us, with us and through us.

For me the Christian faith is the best way for people to start to glimpse new horizons for their lives, to find a new vocation for their gifts and skills, a new momentum to do something that leads towards a still-to-be-dreamed of legacy. When we think of the

people mentioned in the nativity narratives of Matthew and Luke we realise their partnership with God changed the course of human history; it was less about their ability and everything to do with their availability.

The old poster that has the recruitment finger and saying "Your country needs you!" retains a ring of truth; but I believe there is a far bigger truth to celebrate at the start of a new year, in an alternative version that says: "Your God wants you!"

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Update from Bourn Primary

The Autumn Term was, as always, extremely busy and every week was packed full of activities both in and outside of the classrooms. Our new Reception intake have settled very well into school life; this was demonstrated by their confident performance of "Busy Busy Bethlehem" on the penultimate Friday of the term.



The new Library, funded by Bourn School Association, is now fully completed and is being put to very good use. New books relevant to our Enrichment topics have been ordered to fill the smart new shelves, all thanks to the generosity of the BSA and fundraising events such as *Bourn to Run* and *Christmas Capers*.

The changing rooms, situated alongside the swimming pool, are used throughout the year by classes to change for PE lessons and other sporting activities. They are unheated and extremely cold in the winter months, however all this is soon to change. With the money raised from *Bourn to Run* the changing rooms are soon to be refurbished to include heating, new flooring, lockers and improved lighting.

In November children from across the School researched their ancestry as part of a homework task. The results were truly amazing. We now have a display in our entrance hall which links our pupils to countries and cultures all over the world.

We have a variety of after-school clubs which are run by teachers throughout the year. Mrs Culley our Key Stage 2 leader, is currently running a Writers Club for aspiring authors. The Club entered its first writing competition, organised by St Mary's School in Cambridge, early in the term. With nearly 400 entrants, we were delighted that all of our entrants were invited to the prize giving ceremony. Laura Reid from Year 4 was one of the youngest competitors and her imaginative story gained a place in the top seven. The Club's second competition entry, this time into a poetry competition, has been equally as successful.

Bourn Bistro, our catering operation, was initially set up to provide good quality lunches for pupils and staff. Three years on, we are now looking to expand our business into the community by providing cakes and refreshments for particular events. Heidi Allen's December Newsletter

This last month has demonstrated to me the power of the House of Commons and also the responsibility that comes with being a member of it.

On 25th November, the Chancellor unveiled his Autumn statement. As always with these things, there is an awful lot of speculation beforehand as people try and second guess the contents. From my point of view, there were two especially sweet triumphs. Firstly, the decision to scrap the planned changes to tax credits. If you read my article last month, you will recall I had dedicated my maiden speech somewhat controversially to encouraging the Chancellor to think again about his plans in this area. So I was absolutely delighted to hear the Chancellor's acknowledgement that this was the right thing to do. This is democracy in action.

And if that wasn't enough, there was the announcement we had all been waiting to hear for decades – the commitment to deliver a fairer funding formula for our schools by 2017. For years, Cambridgeshire has been one of the very lowest funded authorities in the country – indeed for some time, we were right at the bottom of the list.

Since being elected, I have visited many of our schools and seen first-hand the amazing dedication of our teachers to deliver an outstanding education despite having to mend and make do. Many of our schools are at breaking point and honestly, I don't think we could have continued as we were for any longer without educational standards really starting to slide. So this announcement could not have come a moment sooner.

But days aren't always as positive as this in Westminster. You will I am sure, know Parliament recently voted on bombing Daesh targets in Syria. Undoubtedly the most difficult and significant vote of my parliamentary career so far, I took the decision to vote in favour of this action. You can read my reasoning for why I voted as I did here on my website. http://www.heidisouthcambs.co.uk/military-intervention-syria-0 In early December, I also spoke in the Commons on the subject of mental health, a topic very close to my heart.

In my first few months as an MP I received a letter from a constituent from Meldreth, Steve Mallen about the tragic suicide of his son Edward. As I write this newsletter, it would have been Edward's 19th birthday. Following the death of his gifted and wonderful son, Steve set up the MindEd Trust, and with the support of schools, charities and world leading academics, Steve's ambition is to roll out a wellbeing programme in schools to help with young people's mental health.

Steve and I have met with Government ministers to enlist their help and the Rt Hon Alistair Burt, the Minister for Care and Support has agreed to attend the launch conference in Cambridge on 18 March 2016. If you would like to learn more or be involved, please do get in touch with my office.
