Vicar's Letter

I love maps! I've got quite a collection, and whenever I go to a new place, the first thing I try to do it get a map so I know where I am and where I'm going. It may seem old-fashioned in an age of GPS, but at least with a map the battery never runs out!

Most of the things printed on maps represent something physical – even the contour lines show actual heights – but there's one class of lines on the map which are different. These are the boundaries – between villages, districts, counties ... and nations.

Many such lines are simply historical accidents – though even something as minor as a parish boundary can cause problems for a couple wanting to get married in church. Boundaries between nations, though, are often drawn in blood – the results of conflicts. Borders are drawn by, and maintained (sometimes savagely) by, the rich and powerful, to prop up their vested interests. And because of this, they often bear little relationship to the communities of people who are affected by them. It would take far more space than I have even to just *list* the violence and conflict going on around the world right now as a result.

The church has just celebrated the feast of Pentecost, remembering how God's Holy Spirit came to the disciples after the risen Jesus had ascended to heaven. The Holy Spirit's first act was to tear up the map – breaching national, religious, even linguistic boundaries – and create a new community of Jesus' followers.

At a special celebration in Papworth Village Hall, I saw people from Bourn, Cambourne, Caxton, Elsworth, Eltisley, Graveley, Papworth, and probably more besides, many of whom had never met each other before. We all ignored the liens on the map in favour of what we shared: our desire to worship God through our Lord Jesus Christ.

It's not as if Christians are immune to divisions, borders, and boundaries — if only that were true! — but when we put those aside and celebrate what we have in common, amazing things happen. The same can happen outside church, too. The next time you find yourself on the "wrong" side of a line on the map, look instead at the faces of the people on the other side. You might be surprised!

Broadband for Kingston – Progress!

Your parish council met recently with representatives from BT Openreach and Connecting Cambridgeshire and had a very positive meeting. All present fully understood both the problems caused by the abysmally slow speeds currently 'enjoyed' in Kingston, and our dismay that the first phase of the Connecting Cambridgeshire project has brought little if any improvement.

The really good news is that the solution proposed by BT to bring superfast broadband to Kingston under Phase 2 of the project is Fibre to the Premises ("FTTP") broadband. This is the most advanced form of fibre optic broadband and is currently only available in a few areas of the country. This theoretically means speeds of up to 300Mbps — a thousand times faster than currently received by many households in Kingston, those on the western edges for example.

This will be achieved by running fibre optic cables to Kingston and through the village using the existing telegraph poles. Households who wish to subscribe to the FTTP service will need an engineer's visit as a fibre optic cable has to be run from the house to a manifold on the telegraph pole. This will be organised through your chosen Internet Service Provider. There will undoubtedly be an additional cost to install this service, but that is also true of other fibre optic broadband services. The existing copper telephone wires will remain in place, so those households who don't want a fibre broadband service can simply ignore it and stick with what they have.

The expected timetable is to have most of the village cabled up by the end of 2016, and the remainder by mid 2017. Unfortunately there are a handful of households on the edge of the parish who cannot be reached by this service; they will have to hope that solutions being worked on for other areas, for example for the village of Arrington, can be extended to cover them instead. Police Seek Public's Help: Churches Warned To Be Vigilant

Thieves may be posing as genuine workers as they systematically strip lead from church roofs across Cambridgeshire, police believe. Following thefts from at least five churches in as many weeks, Cambridgeshire Police has asked the public to help thwart what are believed to be gangs of organised criminals exporting stolen metal by the container-load.

In Cambridgeshire, churches at West Wratting, Conington (which has recently joined our Papworth Team), Swavesey, Comberton and Abbots Ripton have recently fallen victim to metal thieves at a combined cost of hundreds of thousands of pounds.

Nearly all of the 344 churches in the diocese are listed buildings, most at Grade I, which puts them in the top 2.5 per cent of all historic buildings in the country in terms of their cultural and architectural importance. The damage caused can be irreparable and the risk is now deemed largely uninsurable, leaving remote rural communities with very large bills, which far outstrip any money the criminals make from selling on the metal."

Police are urging communities to be on the lookout for seemingly innocent workpeople in the vicinity of vulnerable churches and are urging anyone who sees metal theft in progress to dial 999 immediately, so that the thieves can be caught red-handed. The public is also asked to report 'workmen' near churches outside normal working hours on 01480 422888 or the police non-emergency number, 101.

Spotted Flycatchers do you have this increasingly rare bird breeding in your garden?

Spotted Flycatchers are attractive little migrant birds which are summer visitors to UK village gardens and churchyards. Although they breed with us, they spend ten months of the year travelling between here and their wintering grounds in Southern Africa. This is an increasingly dangerous journey for them, and sadly they are in deep decline. Widespread losses amounted to a 50% decline during 1995-2010, continuing an 88% decline since 1970.

Only some fifty pairs remain breeding in Cambridgeshire, so it's now quite a rare bird, but most rural villages still have a pair or two. The Cambridge Bird Club is running a survey this year to find and monitor nesting pairs, and it's almost certain that there will be additional pairs in our villages of which they are not aware.

Newsletter from our MP, Heidi Allen

As always, it has been an exceptionally busy few weeks with meetings with Ministers about Primary school testing, opening post offices and affordable housing schemes and a visit to a muddy Northstowe!



During recent visits to Swavesey and Hauxton Primary Schools, I chatted at length to staff, governors and Headteachers about Key Stage 1 and 2 testing. They expressed concern about the potential for excessive stress on the children and the appropriateness of some of the English grammar tests.

Consequently, Nicky Morgan, the Secretary of State for Education kindly agreed to meet me and four

ladies I now refer to as my "Super heads" to discuss their concerns. We left the meeting feeling positive and encouraged that the Secretary of State had listened to us. Indeed, I am delighted that in the same month, Nicky has reviewed proposals to force academisation on high performing schools. I am encouraged to believe that the Primary school testing regime may thus be reviewed too.

Looking ahead to our leaders of the future, I was delighted to be invited to take questions from the students of Sawston Village College's Politics Society. It was fantastic to hear their passion and enthusiasm, and an impressive level of political engagement, far more that I displayed at their age!

Last month I also took a visit to Northstowe, to see the almost complete Primary school and general progress on site. I am pleased to report that at long last, we will see houses being built towards the end of the year. Housing as you know, is one of our greatest challenges in South Cambridgeshire, especially affordable housing. So I was pleased to be asked to officially open a scheme of part



rent, part buy homes built by CHS in Whittlesford. Beautifully finished, they will be a great asset to the local community.

There were more reasons to celebrate as I opened the new post office in Cottenham and refurbished village stores and post office in Oakington. Post Offices provide a vital lifeline so I work on a regular basis with Post Office UK to ensure we keep ours going. I am currently working with councillors in Cambourne to try and identify a site there.

A final item worth mentioning as I sign off this month, is a meeting I had with Liz Truss, Secretary of State for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs. I asked to meet



with her on behalf of a number of my farmers who were experiencing delays in their annual payments. I am told they should now all be completed by the deadline, but please do get in touch with Julia in my office if you are still waiting to hear.

You might recall from my last newsletter that I had been trialling a new "no appointment

necessary" surgery model. I have held two further such surgeries in Cottenham and Queen Edith's which proved very popular with dozens of residents attending to talk to me about various issues. Please see my website

The Kingston Poor's Land Charity

I suspect many people in the village are unaware of this local Kingston charity which exists to help anyone in need in the parish. The charity owns a plot of land next to the parish boundary within the parish of Bourn. The land is rented and this is the primary income of the charity. The trustees are appointed by the Parish Council and serve for 4 years. The current trustees are Joan Reynolds and Donal O'Donnell. The trustees receive no fees. The charity is registered with the Charity Commission (241398). (See http://apps.charitycommission.gov.uk/ where there is a record of our annual returns). The charity submits an annual report to the Parish Council at the Annual Parish Meeting.

The origins of the charity are unknown. The earliest records we have go back to 1933 but I suspect the charity has been in existence for at least 100 years before that. Maybe some of the older residents of the village may know more about the early history of the charity.

The record book for 1933 lists the primary task of the trustees as:

"The charity shall be given away in cash to the poor of Kingston Parish at noon on the 21st of December of each year".

Payments of 1 shilling and 11 pence were made to each family for each of their children. The number of such payments made per year ranged from about 80 to over 100.

This continued until 1966 when the Charity Commission ruled: "that money should not be distributed in driblets (sic) but larger sums should be given in cases of special need." The charity continued to make the Christmas payments which were increased to £4 but the average number of recipients reduced to only about 5 people. Over the years since then the value of the individual payments has increased but the number of recipients varies according to need.

In 2000 the remit was reviewed to broaden the scope of the charity. The current remit is: We provide payments to individuals and organisations in the parish for the relief of poverty and for education and training. We provide help especially for children and young people, elderly people and people with disabilities.

From that time, we started making payments, usually book tokens to school leavers to support their further education and training. We still make some Christmas payments and we will make payments, as necessary, to support anyone who needs help, as and when it is needed. Payments are at the discretion of the trustees.

We consider making payments to anyone that we hear needs our help. If you know of someone who needs help in the village you may contact either of the trustees.
