Vicar's Letter Harvest 2016

Another year goes by!

For those few growing the earlier winter Barley, the dull first half of June was a bit of a disaster, but the sporadic sun in the second half of June provided enough energy to the later Spring barley, wheats and oil seed rape crops to produce average yields, but not for everyone.

Sadly one of our tractor drivers had suffered a stroke since the last harvest and was no longer able to join us: our best wishes and prayers for him for his recovery.

With the sun coming out, the combines went in for the oil seed rape in late July: what an easy harvest weather wise! Only two days rain to get the newly sown oil seed rape going, but with wall to wall sunshine, little storage drying has been required this year.

And apart from one trailer inadvertently hitting the barn door which needed repairing – no accidents (wonderful!) but the usual machinery breakdowns included one of the combine drivers having a 6.00pm 'sinking feeling' only to find the back axle had broken in half: the vast cost of shipping a new piece in from America was avoided by jacking the combine up, removing the axle that evening, and welding it together the next day and the combine was back in action within 24 hours. A huge thank you to the two very skilful engineers who achieved this remarkable feat.

More people took the advantage to ride in the combines this year than ever before, and one mother and her 14 year old from Cambourne showed such an interest in farming they stayed for the whole day... the new management here are definitely 'up' for encouraging the younger generation to explore a career in farming.

But the staggering productivity of the land remains breathtaking: I mentioned last year the wheat figures: if all our 900 tonnes of Zulu wheat went for Weetabix, at 2000 ½ kilo packets a tonne, the retailers should see 1.8 million packets. And here's a new one: the oil from Oil seed rape is used in a thin layer to separate the nougat from the toffee in Mars Bars. One tonne of oil seed rape would produce enough oil for 1.25 million Mars Bars; so the 266 tonnes of OSR on this farm could be enough to produce 332 million Mars Bars!

And a thought for the year: do we just sail on and assume all this productivity and food is our 'right' or that this is just the way it is, or do we thank the God behind all life for the extraordinary productivity of the earth we have been given? I will go on my annual pilgrimage and give thanks for this abundance and you are welcome to slip through the open church door anytime you like and do the same.

Parish Council News

Village litter bins: we are still pushing to have the final open-top litter bin (by the old well) to be replaced with the new type – I have even got our District Councillor to lean a little more heavily on the responsible supervisor at South Cambs. It is annoying when you have to spend time chasing people up again and again on minor matters like this! Why can't salaried employees do their job properly?

Tunnel at Playground: the timbers at either end of the tunnel, some of which had rotted, have now been replaced. After some pressure the suppliers, Playdale Playgrounds, agreed to share the cost of this repair by providing the materials free of charge.

Annual audit: the audit of the Parish Council accounts for 2015/16 is complete, with no matters of concern found by the auditors.

Permissive path: there have been some delays in the repair of the fence running alongside the permissive footpath next to the old railway bridge near Toft, but this is hoped to be completed in the next week or two. As previously reported, the clearing of brambles etc along this path is now carried out twice per year by our contractor, so please let me know of any serious problems of encroaching vegetation impeding progress along this path.

Telephone box: the payphone in Field Road is again under threat of removal, as part of BT's rationalisation of little-used payphones. The number of calls made from our payphone in the last 12 months is zero. There is a consultation period until 10 October, and the Parish Council intends to object to the removal of the phone, as last time, on the grounds that the mobile phone signal in this part of the village is poor or non-existent, and this phone therefore may be vital in the event of an emergency at the village hall.

- S/277/16/FL an application has been submitted to demolish a porch extension and replace with a conservatory at Tranquil, Rectory Lane
- S/1719/16/FL permission has been granted for construction of new garden building at Thatches, Rectory Lane
- S/3212/15/PA permission has been granted for change of use of an agricultural building at Kingston Pastures Farm, Old Wimpole Road

My Father Regimental Number 6848139 9th Battalion KRRC Rifleman

Killed on the 12th April 1941 age approx 21 years old

I never knew my father; he died in 1941. Killed in the Second World War.

I was always led to believe he was killed on Crete. This was not quite true.

As I was to find out later.

It all started on the 50th anniversary of VE day. It was held in an old barn on Paynes Farm along with a BBQ.

Tables were laid out with memorabilia from the WW2.

I put out my Father's medals which my mother gave me many years earlier along with other peoples' items. A gentleman of around 70years old who hadn't lived in the village many years by the name of Mr Alfred Gotts asked me who's were the medals. I said they were mine or rather my father's who was killed in the war. Alfred as I will call him from now told me he came from London and said my Father must have been a Londoner and was in the Rangers part of the Kings Royal Rifles. He said he might have been killed in Greece or Crete. Some of this I knew and wondered how he knew.

Alfred was in the Artillery along with his brother and they served together through WW2. At the beginning of the war Alfred was stationed in a village a few miles from here called Hardwick. Part of the defence of Bourn Airfield.

Alfred and his brother were then sent to North Africa, then to Greece.

My father's battalion the 9th was sent to Egypt in November 1940. In March 1941 they were sent to Northen Greece. One month later he was killed.

It was in northern Greece that Alfred's regiment was retreating from the Germans when he tells me the Rangers from KRR were heading the other way.

He told me soldiers from his unit were shouting there was a retreat on and to join them but were told by the Rangers the guns were to be protected at all costs and they were to hold up the Germans' advance as long as possible.

It was in this battle my father was killed.

Ironically when the artillery guns reached Athens they were destroyed, as there was no means of getting them back to North Africa.

After being told this story I wrote to the war graves commission that put me touch with somebody in the Regimental records office who gave me some more details. An extract from the book <u>Swift and Bold</u> the WW2 History of the KRRC was sent to me concerning what happened on the day he was killed.

I do not think he has a known grave. His name is on the War Memorial in Phaeleron, Athens.

Valerie and I went to Crete and met Alfred and Doreen Gotts who showed us around parts of Crete where Alfred fought the Germans in the battle for Crete. We also visited the military cemetery in Souder Bay. Many young men no more than boys really 19 and 20 years old were buried there along with soldiers from New Zealand and Australia. Beautifully kept but what a waste of life. I laid a bunch of flowers on the grave of a young soldier from the same Regiment in which my father served.

I know very little of my Father as when I came to write this story most people who knew him were dead.

I often wonder if my Father and Alfred passed each other in that far off country. I hope so as it might have been another link with my Father.

Alfred also died while I was writing this book so I never learnt any more of the war in Crete and North Africa which was a sad loss. He had a lot of stories to tell but as far as I know they never got written down.

I never asked my mother enough about my father when she was alive as it was before I started this story and you always think there is plenty of time, but I am afraid there is not as much as we think there is.

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Hobbies Corner

At the end of this summer's Olympics, BBC TV presented a collage of the most poignant moments involving GB medallists, accompanied by the late Joe Cocker's pounding version of "With a Little Help From My Friends". Notwithstanding the emotional tug of the piece, as a long-standing record collector I realized that this was not the original hit version, this one having an almost ethereal organ-driven intro. Hunting down this alternate recording, I found a live version of it on The Best of Joe Cocker CD. This got me thinking about cover versions and how they can sometimes enhance the original recordings. "With a Little Help From My Friends", of course, was the second track on the Beatles' eighth studio album Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band, recorded in EMI's Abbey Road Studios from November 1966 (amazing to think that's almost fifty years old) and released on June 1, 1967. Intended as a counter to the Beach Boys' Pet Sounds album, it provided the soundtrack for the so-called Summer of Love and, in 2003, Rolling Stone magazine ranked it as no. 1 in the list of the "500 Greatest Albums of All Time". You would think that such a great, milestone album full of great tracks wouldn't produce any worthwhile covers yet this hasn't proved to be the case, the LP proving to be the gift that has kept on giving. In the 1970s Elton John made a creditable, reggaetinged attempt to cover "Lucy in the Sky with Diamonds" but, more recently, this has been eclipsed by a wonderful stripped-down, acoustic version by Georgia-born Katie Melua. I suspect that I discovered the latter later than most, largely through the championing of her songs by BBC Radio Two. Anything by Katie Melua, however, is worth investigating; she's a dab-hand at covers ("Wonderful Life", "Feels Like Home", "Love Me Tender", and "It's Over") but her cover of "Lucy in the Sky with Diamonds" is in a class of its own, largely because it was such a great song to begin with and Melua treats it with the utmost respect. It is quietly great. The same can't be said of most of Jeff Beck's recordings yet, fresh off his retro **Rock 'n' Roll Party** album, he also pulled off a Beatles cover from Sgt. Pepper's that goes a long way to surpassing the original. His instrumental rendition of "A Day in the Life" is majestic, challenging and uniquely his own. It provides rich evidence, says critic Charles Shaar Murray, of the uniquely vocal and expressive quality that Beck brings to the electric guitar and can be found on the album Jeff Beck Live and Exclusive from the Grammy Museum. Incidentally, the Katie Melua song can only be obtained as one of the extra tracks on the Special Bonus Edition of her second album Piece by Piece. Happy listening!







Our MP Heidi Allen's Latest Newsletter

As I write this, I find myself wondering where the Summer went? The six weeks while Parliament is closed, otherwise known as recess, has flown by. Being away from Westminster gives me significantly more time to talk to people in South Cambridgeshire and this Summer, I took the opportunity to spend time with some of our healthcare providers. Conscious of the pressures on our NHS, I wanted to understand first hand how we are coping with workload locally.

The day I spent shadowing GPs at Comberton surgery highlighted to me the challenges facing the profession. The working day for a GP is very long, with limited time available for each patient, but the work they do in keeping patients away from hospitals is absolutely critical. One of the key issues facing junior doctors thinking of a career as a GP is the high cost of indemnity insurance, something which is covered for them if they work instead in a hospital. As such, I have written to the Minister to see what we can do to change this situation. We are in dire need of more GPs, so this additional burden is unhelpful. I also wanted to see how morale was amongst the wider junior doctor community, so I joined all the trainees at Addenbrooke's at one of their team meetings. Our health service in South Cambridgeshire has been lucky to attract such a diverse and thoughtful group of individuals who care passionately about safeguarding our wonderful NHS. Although my powers as a backbencher are limited and I have no influence over decisions made about their new contract, the least I can do is listen.

Locally, our County Council and Mental Health Trust is working together to provide innovative solutions to support people in crisis. My visit to the newly opened 'Sanctuary' in Cambridge highlighted the importance of providing mental health patients with a 'third space', accessible during times of crisis. The centre was welcoming, calm and staffed by an exceptionally dedicated team who are determined to improve our local mental health provision. I saw a similar ethos at the Women's Refuge Centre in Cambridge and was impressed by the absolutely vital work they are doing for women and children in distress. These two centres provide support for the most vulnerable in our society and deserve our unwavering support.

Disability rights also featured highly on my to do list as I made a visit to the new PIP centre in Cambourne to undertake a 'mock' PIP assessment. This local branch makes a stressful process much easier by saving over an hour's journey time for those requiring assessment. Until recently, disabled claimants of this benefit (Personal Independence Payment) had to travel to Thetford so I am pleased the provider listened to the needs of my constituents and agreed to open a local centre.

I have also worked with colleagues from the Papworth Trust, Anglia Ruskin University, the DWP and Daniel Zeichner (Cambridge City MP) to run a Reverse Jobs Fair in September. We invited local employers to a free networking event to showcase the value of employing disabled people. Dozens of businesses came along and saw how employing disabled staff could bring real value to their organisations whilst also delivering the jobs and independence that disabled workers deserve. Next challenge is to get some concrete job offers – watch this space!

Our job fair coincided with the end of the 2016 Paralympics, with South Cambs resident Clare Cunningham competing in the Paratriathlon. Already a gold medal Paralympian swimmer I'm sure you'll join me in cheering her on, admiring her determination and dedication to this second sport.

Determination and the belief that two heads are better than one was very much in evidence as local resident Alison Kitching and I negotiated with Stagecoach for reduced rates for sixth formers. I'm delighted we managed to secure a better deal in time for September and hope other operators will consider following suit.

Puttock's Dene

I know that several of us have seen red kites in Kingston this year and I have heard that they have bred at Girton, although they can't be said to be established in Cambridgeshire as they are further north and east in Northamptonshire and the Chilterns. Buzzards, on the other hand, can be seen almost every day. Two natural streams drain the parish of Kingston from the south to the north into the Bourn Brook: New Ditch from Kingston Wood flows through what used to be known until quite recently as The Great Dene (*dene* = valley). The stream from Eversden Wood, which comes down past Brook Cottage, doesn't have a name as far as I am aware, but in the medieval era its valley was called Puttock's Dene. *Puttock* is an old word, no longer in common use, for the red kite, but also sometimes referred to the buzzard or other large birds of prey. Which of these birds inspired our forbears to name this valley?
