Vicar's Letter

The Money Note

I have a number of friends who are professional singers, and they sometimes refer to something they call "the money note". It's that one note in a piece — often a particularly high one — that a singer must hit if they are to earn their money ... and an invitation to sing again!

It can feel like that in all our roles: perhaps it's the month's sales figures, the vital client presentation, the season's crop yield, or the Easter Day sermon. I'm sure you will have something, in whatever job you do, where the outside world will judge you – and hopefully reward you – for that one moment of peak performance.

And then you have to do it again. And again. Until it can become a burden, because doing it well this time sets the expectation that you will do it even better next time. None of us is perfect, and none of us can be absolutely at our peak all the time, let alone keep getting better for ever.

The church season of Lent, with its emphasis on testing and trying to achieve something we wouldn't normally, shows this up especially. Those who try to 'give up' something, or take on something extra, soon find out how hard it is to hit the money note over and over.

Fortunately for us, the Easter story is the story of God hitting that money note for us. Jesus, God the Son, lived the perfect life then died as if he hadn't, sacrificing himself for us. Then, hitting the biggest money note of all, God raised Jesus from the dead!

Because of what Jesus did, we can be assured that God offers us acceptance and forgiveness, regardless of how we perform in our jobs, regardless of how we cope, or don't cope, in our personal lives, and however often we hit or miss the money note.

A fifth dovecote in Kingston?

From The Cambridge Chronicle, 9th August, 1851:

KINGSTON. – Robbery. – On the night of Wednesday, the 6th inst., some thieves visited the premises of Capt. Mail [sic], of Kingston, broke open his dove-house, and carried off about 50 pigeons.

Captain Richard Male built South Sea House in 1850, as an inscribed stone panel above the front door of the house states. It is assumed that he made his fortune as a Master Mariner in the South Seas (which may refer to the Pacific or the China Sea). He is buried (1869) with other members of his family under a table tomb, south of the chancel in the churchyard. But where was his dove-house? Somewhere in his farmyard, presumably. In last month's magazine four dovecotes were listed in Kingston. This brief mention in *The Cambridge Chronicle* suggests that there were in fact five.

Parish Council News

Coalition of Parish Councils: Kingston Parish Council is joining a coalition of 20 local parish councils, which has as its statement of purpose: 'The Coalition of Parish Councils exists to voice our concerns on key strategic transport and planning issues affecting our communities'. We expect a representative of Kingston Parish Council to attend their regular meetings to add our voice to that of the other member parish councils, which are Arrington, Barton, Bourn, Boxworth, Caldecote, Caxton, Connington, Coton, Croxton, Dry Drayton, Elsworth, Eltisley, Eversdens, Grantchester, Hardwick, Knapwell, Longstowe, Madingley and Toft. One of the current issues being addressed by the Coalition is the proposed building of 3,500 houses at Bourn Airfield. The Coalition opposes this development and has made a submission to the Government-appointed inspector presiding over the Examination in Public site-specific hearings on the proposed development, which take place on 4-6 April. It has also written to the Secretary of State for Transport to plead for the interchange serving the M11, A428 and A14 at Girton to be made 'all-ways'.

Parish Council elections: South Cambridgeshire District Council has decided that, in line with District Council practice, Parish Council elections will now all take place together every 4 years, starting in 2018. This replaces the previous arrangement under which 'batches' of parish councils held elections every year.

Grass and hedge cutting: the contract for the 2017 season has been awarded again to Buchan's Landscapes, who have now served us well for several years, and offered a renewal price increase which was well below inflation. We are grateful for feedback on their performance from residents - please report any concerns regarding grass or hedge cutting to me.

Cream Tea Party on The Orchard: The Parish Council is again combining with the PCC to hold a Cream Tea Party on the Orchard on the same day as Church Gift Day, when intrepid teddy bears can be seen leaping bravely from the church tower to parachute down to the grass below. All residents are invited – there is no charge for the Cream Tea Party although the church will be grateful for donations towards its running costs. The date is 15 July – put it in your diary now! More information nearer the time.

Annual Parish Meeting: This meeting will be held this year on 18 May at 8.00pm in the village hall. This is a public meeting, not a parish council meeting, to which all residents are invited. Reports are presented by representatives of the various groups and activities in the village, and there is a 'General Forum' for anyone to

ask questions or air their views on matters of common interest. Last year we trialled a new format under which, rather than presenters reading out their entire reports word-for-word, highlights only were presented, with full written reports being distributed to all attending. This seemed to work well, and will be repeated this year. All welcome - come along, and enjoy a glass of wine before the meeting.

Letter from the Chief Inspector Village parking problems

I am aware from the many emails South Cambs officers receive and from Neighbourhood Panel meetings that parking is a constant concern for many residents in villages across South Cambridgeshire.

Many of you may know that I cannot prioritise parking patrols over investigating and preventing crime and responding to calls for service. In light of this, it means that my officers might not do as much parking enforcement as many of you would like.

I have been giving some thought on how we can meet your expectations on parking enforcement and I have decided that we are going to try something new. I have therefore set up an online web-page where you can report concerns about parking. The information that you give us will go directly to me and will help us build a picture of the exact hot-spots for parking issues. I will then use this information on targeted 'crack-down' days. There is some good evidence that crack-downs work in other areas of policing so we are going to try it for parking. For obvious reasons I will not be publicising the dates of the crackdowns in advance, but updates will be sent to you by e-cops, twitter and Facebook once we have completed a crackdown day. I am not pretending that this will solve all parking problems, however, I do think that it strikes the right balance between dealing with parking concerns and the other important work that we do.

Recent Media Coverage about Policing in Villages

Some of you may have seen recent media reporting regarding our policing of villages. I would like to emphasise that we do prioritise policing of the villages but what I do ask is that my officers prioritise the 'hottest' areas within our villages. This does mean that certain areas in some villages get more attention than those villages with very low crime. I believe this is a sensible approach to policing which most of you would agree with. The main benefit of our local policing structure is that you have your own, dedicated local resources that are responsible for policing South Cambs rather than the City.

I have sought to put as much time and effort as possible over the last three years into crime prevention events in the villages (first Op Oaklands and more recently Op Hunter). Your local officers and I work hard to give you the best, most intelligent policing service we can but if you do have any concerns please do get in touch - or come to our next round of neighbourhood panel meetings where you can join in the discussion.

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THE GREAT STORM - OCTOBER 1987

The storm overnight on Wednesday and Thursday 22/23 February 2017, though short lived, brought back strong memories for me of the Great Storm of October 1987.

On Thursday 15th at about 12.30pm I left Cambridge in my ancient Fiat Panda, accompanied by Dougal my West Highland White terrier, to travel in the bright sunshine to Warley Hospital near Brentwood for a visit to my father who had had a major back operation to try halting his cancer.

We arrived about 2pm when, leaving Dougal in the car, I went in to see Father. Every now and then a nurse or doctor would come into the room and comment that the wind was getting up and it was looking as if it might rain.

Leaving at 4.00pm I went out to the car and the rain was just starting. My faithful old car started first time and when I backed out of the parking space the heavens opened! My windscreen wiper (only a single one in the middle of the windscreen) was almost completely useless as we made our way towards the A12 to travel south to the M25 and then turn up the M11. Once on the A12 the traffic was fairly heavy but on the M25 everything came to an almost full stop. The rain was so bad it was hard to see more than the car or lorry in front. We crawled to the M25/11 interchange with the wind whipping the rain straight and level. When we finally joined the M11 and inched our way up the hill towards North Weald Airport, the noise of wind and rain was horrendous. Dougal, who normally was very quiet in the car, tried hard to sit on my lap and cuddle into me. He was terrified. Suddenly as we moved beyond the trees on the lefthand side the noise became even worse. I can only compare it to what it might have been like to have been in London during the Blitz.

The louder noise dropped a little to just the sound of wind and rain again as we came to the Harlow turn though the travelling speed did not improve until I came off the M11 at Trumpington. I finally arrived at home in Perne Road at just before 9.00pm. Both Dougal and I were really glad to close the front door and take a deep breath.

It was only watching the news the next day that I saw what had made the awful noise beside North Weald Airport. There was a lot of road work going on around that stretch of the M11 and there were caravans and mobile homes on the western side of the road. The wind had picked up three or four of these and taken them over the M11 and dumped them on the airport.

Looking around after the storm last week (I am writing this on 26 February) the loss of trees is somewhat less than in October 1987 but I always feel that any tree lost to a storm is also a loss of history. A reminder that almost my father's last comment to me in November 1987 was "It is so sad to lose so many trees."

April Love

It seems that more songs have been written about April than any other month. Why this should be the case is an interesting question. It's seen as a romantic time of year and is associated with springtime – both very good reasons for writing a song. "April Showers" (originally recorded by Al Jolson) and "April in Paris" (recorded by Ella Fitzgerald and Louis Armstrong amongst others) are both songs that fall into this romance-in-springtime category. The archetypal track, however, is "April Love", recorded in 1957 by Pat Boone, who had the hit, but also by Connie Francis and Billy Vaughn. You have to feel for American artists in the '50s. First, they had to beat off the opposition in their homeland and then deal with covers by UK artists over here. It went further than that, however; in the UK they all had to compete with cheap, sub-standard recordings on the "Embassy" label sold in Woolworths stores. I'm not sure I should admit to this, but in 1958 I went to Woolworths and bought the Embassy version of "April Love" sung by goodness knows who (actually, in some cases, the Embassy recordings were by up-andcoming artists who later made it big, often under different names). The fact remains, however, that "April Love" was, and is, a great song.

In more recent times, Simon and Garfunkel recorded "April Come She Will" on their second studio album, Rufus Wainwright recorded "April Fools" and Prince on his Parade album released in 1986 included the utterly brilliant track "Sometimes It Snows in April" (which, having lived in a neighbouring state to Minnesota, I can testify as being a true statement). Simon and Garfunkel included their track on the 1966 "Sounds of Silence" album but the song itself had been written by Paul Simon a few years earlier while in England. Not surprisingly, therefore, he talks about April being the time "when streams are ripe and swelled with rain" and, lyrically, uses the changing seasons as a metaphor for his girl-friend's changing moods.

In one of his best ever tracks, Prince alludes to the disappointment that comes with snow in April. You wait all winter for the weather to improve in spring, only to experience more of the same winter weather. As he says, "Springtime was always my favourite time of year/A time for lovers holding hands in the rain", but these hopes are dashed when the snow reappears and, to make things worse, his good friend dies. As he concludes:

Sometimes it snows in April
Sometimes I feel so bad
Sometimes, sometimes I wish that life was never ending
And all good things, they say, never last.

This is a much different world to that depicted in "April Love", bitter-sweet as opposed to just sweet, adult as opposed to juvenile, utterly realistic as opposed to pie-in-the-sky, sad as opposed to hopeful. My three year old grandson appears to understand these sentiments as he recently said, when offered a balloon at a party, why accept it when you know it's going to fly away or burst. Why look forward to spring when the snow could still fly. In some ways that's a sad response, albeit very pragmatic. Yet I can't help liking both the two very diverse tracks and their attendant emotions. Pessimism has its place but optimism gives us the hope to keep on soldiering on. While pessimism keeps you grounded, it is optimism that helps you soar.



Chuck Prophet, Singer and Songwriter

I bought Chuck Prophet's newly released album on the strength of the title song alone. Titled "Bobby Fuller Died For Your Sins", thankfully the record (I bought the vinyl version) hasn't let me down. Full of guitar licks and classic rock and roll references (I hear echoes of Lou Reed, David Bowie, Bob Dylan, Tom Petty, Mott the Hoople and Jackson Browne), Prophet describes his music as "California Noir", an exploration of the tension between the romance of the California Dream and the stark reality of life as it really is. Behind the popular images of Hollywood and the sun-baked sea and surf of California's beaches lies the reality: the sordid and tawdry underworld of sex, drugs and rock 'n' roll.

Which is where the reference to Bobby Fuller comes in. Fuller hailed from El Paso, Texas, and wound up in Los Angeles in the early 1960s with two hits quickly under his belt. "Love's Made a Fool of You" and the powerfully iconoclastic "I Fought the Law" (later recorded by the Clash). Displaying his roots in music (Buddy Holly and the Crickets in Texas and Eddie Cochran in California), his first hit was previously a hit for Buddy Holly and "I Fought the Law" was written by Sonny Curtis who joined the Crickets after Buddy Holly's death and was first released on the 1960 record "In Style with the Crickets". In 1966, at the height of his popularity but caught up in the seamier side of the Californian under-life, Bobby Fuller was found dead in his car outside his LA apartment, apparently asphyxiated. Rumours have swirled ever since about his "suicide" (Mafia and LAPD involvement and a "mobbed-up" girlfriend have all been cited as contributing factors) but the fact remains, as Chuck Prophet attests, that Bobby Fuller died **because of** all our sins. He lived, however temporarily, the high-life only to be caught up in the low-life. Although the album's title may be construed as being sacrilegious, I believe Prophet (an apt name perhaps) is trying to make a serious point: that the glitz and glamour of the celebrity life is a short step away from seedy street. His record stands as a warning to all those of us who chase false idols.

If you like guitar-based classic rock and roll with edgy lyrics and grown-up themes then this is the LP for you. The title track is a wonderful melange of riffs from "I Fought the Law" and modern musings and, as such, is worth the price of the LP alone. Seek out also the track "Bad Year for Rock and Roll", a timely piece of homage to David Bowie and other rock stars that we lost in 2016. I had never heard of Chuck Prophet before, but I shall certainly be delving into his ten-plus previous recordings.

One of the particular delights for me as your local Vicar is when we welcome families to a church service for the christening of a young child; not least because the parents have made a very conscious choice to celebrate the recent birth by giving thanks to God and asking for His blessing on their baby as part of a wider celebration and gathering. Your local church is good at doing this bit with you! In my experience, it is not unusual for a range of thoughts to be in the minds of parents at such a time. For some it is about establishing or espousing a Christian framework for the values and patterns they intend their child to grow up knowing. For others to have a child christened is a reflection of their own faith so that when the time comes the child – maybe as a teenager – has a backcloth against which to make their own choice to continue in that way or leave the way of faith behind. Equally it is not unusual that parents just know it's what they want to do and may be very unsure about what they really believe themselves.

I like to encourage parents who are considering having a child christened to see this as one small step towards what — at its best — can become a lifelong pattern of knowing and enjoying God; but whether or not people are thinking like you, you will find it is an opportunity for the Christian church to extend a welcome and reflect back to you the unwavering love of God for you.

Yes, God actually likes us, loves us and wants us to know Him better; so christening is an important way of saying, in effect, 'That sounds and feels good to us; let's see where this leads us!'

I hope parents, grandparents, wider family members and friends will read this and say to one another something along these lines: 'Wouldn't it be nice to explore having christened at the local church?!'

I remember feeling awe-struck minutes after the birth of our first child; that this little bundle was God's gift to my wife and I — what a delight and privilege! I know I was not unusual, and part of the contribution the church in this village can make at this time is to share this with you by showing something of God's delight also!

Our MP Heidi Allen's Newsletter (Feb-Mar 2017)

In my last newsletter, education was the key theme – this month it's all things infrastructure! Where to start...!?

I had the pleasure of meeting the new chief executive of the City Deal, Rachel Stopard. You won't be surprised to hear I shared my concerns with her about the Cambourne to Cambridge busway proposal known as 3/3a, which would cut across green belt north of Coton. We must of course find an effective public transport link, but spending upwards of £140m on a guided busway that cuts through swathes of greenbelt and doesn't even connect with the city centre is sheer madness to me. Local groups are proposing alternative, cheaper options and I will fight hard to ensure they are considered fully before a final decision is made. Public money is tight and we must spend it wisely.

I've also coordinated a number of meetings with stakeholders including Highways England, Abellio Greater Anglia, Govia, Laing, Network Rail, District Council Leader Peter Topping and County Councillors to name but a few! I want us to bid for some of the Government's Autumn statement money for a number of local improvements. It may be that we can combine funds with those available in the existing City Deal and our devolution deal due to go live in May. I'm interested principally in upgrading the A505 from the M11 to the A11 including the bridge at Whittlesford (I haven't forgotten about a cycle path linking Duxford and Whittlesford!) and the well overdue Foxton level crossing. I've also held meetings to understand progress on plans for the A428 upgrade and Oxford-Cambridge rail link. Last but by no means least, I have pulled together a programme board to really move things forward with a new train station at Addenbrooke's hospital. These projects are at various stages of progression, but I will keep my website

I'd like now to blow the trumpets of our local constabulary! They have recently launched an initiative to tackle parking issues across South Cambridgeshire. They have developed an online form for you to complete to report any parking issues in your area. National Plant Monitoring Scheme

Do you know anyone with an interest in wild plants or who would like to learn more about them? As the weather warms and the days get longer we are looking for people to help us.

The National Plant Monitoring Scheme is helping us to understand what is happening to different habitats across the UK and is set to run for a number of years. The Scheme has been running for two survey seasons and over 900 volunteers have signed up and been out surveying. One of the reasons the scheme has enjoyed such good success in attracting volunteers is because of the support of local parish councils. Many of these volunteers are new to plant surveying and have found the scheme accessible, are enjoying taking part and are exploring places to close to them and finding out new things. Volunteers are supported by materials which are sent to them, online resources and free training courses.

Do you know somebody who enjoys being outside? There are still opportunities to get involved with the scheme as a volunteer. In fact the more volunteers we have the more information is generated allowing us to get an even better understanding of what is happening in the landscape.

Who we are and what we need:

This scheme is a partnership between <u>Botanical Society of Britain and Ireland</u> (BSBI); <u>JNCC</u>; <u>Centre for Ecology and Hydrology</u> (CEH) and <u>Plantlife</u> and is backed by the government. Volunteers are recruited and supported to survey 5 plots in a kilometre square close to where they live. The plots will be surveyed twice a year. The kilometre squares to monitor have been identified by stratified random sampling. The plants have been chosen as indicators of the health of individual habitats. There are 3 levels volunteers can participate at depending on confidence and knowledge and support will be provided both through training; web and telephone.

More help please:

Across Cambridgeshire there are still 12 squares available to survey with more to be released in the future.

We would be hugely grateful if the scheme can be promoted using the NPMS flyer (http://www.npms.org.uk/sites/www.npms.org.uk/files/PDF/NPMS%20flyer.pdf).
