Vicar's Letter

'Landed honest equipment', or 'coffee banquets august', or 'precautions duplicate rush', or 'widen waking solar'? Any of those might describe my usual Sunday morning.

For those who haven't got the slightest idea what I'm on about, each of those is a place: the doors into Bourn, Kingston, and Eltisley churches, and my study respectively. The system called "what three words" divides the entire surface of the planet – cities, oceans, villages, mountains, fields, and forests – into three-metre squares, then associates three words with each square.

There's a phone app which uses GPS to locate the phone and give the words which identify the square it's in. The main aim is to provide a very precise location in an emergency, but people are also using it to have fun: one way is by setting up treasure hunts where each clue gives three words which lead to the place of the next clue.

It got me thinking about how we might put things on a map of our lives with three words. Thinking of life events, perhaps a wedding might be 'church rings love', or a birthday 'cards cake gifts', or Christmas 'Jesus stable angels'. For more everyday things we might be 'rushed desk stressful' when we're at work, or 'novels pool relaxed' when we're on holiday – or in my case 'cliffs tidal boots'.

It can be quite a good challenge to think about a special point in our lives and think of the three words which sum it up most accurately.

And what about our spiritual lives: what words would put them on the map? For some (and for most of us sometimes) our spiritual lives are at 'doubtful confusion searching' when we'd rather be at 'worship joyful secure'. And where do we think God is on that map? Sometimes it might feel like 'absent silence obscure' at others 'soaring glory transcendent'.

But perhaps the most important location is where are we on God's map, and I think the words start with 'beloved'. God loves us more than we can understand, which is why God came in Jesus. He died, so that we can be forgiven for every sin, and rose again so that we can know we are rescued for eternal life with God.

So in God's eyes, whichever three metre square of our planet we are in, we are at Beloved Forgiven Rescued.

Royal Kingston: what's in the name?

The name Kingston is derived from Old English, *Cyningesg-tun*, the King's estate or manor. *Tun* originally meant fence: thus the derived meanings of enclosure, farmstead, settlement, town. Until relatively recently even small villages such as our own were often styled towns: hence the inscription on our silver chalice of c.1570 (and still in use): FOR THE TOWEN OF KINGSTON. Old English was the Germanic language of the Anglo-Saxons and the suffix *tun* is found in place names in both northern Europe and England from the 6th century. Paris Hilton's surname stems from a farm in south-eastern Norway, whence her great-grandfather founded the eponymous hotel chain. More interestingly, perhaps, our very own Toons, of Crane's Lane, derive their surname from exactly the same toponym, which was originally pronounced with this long vowel sound. There are said to be seventeen Kingstons in England and sixty-three in the world (thirty-three in the U.S.A.). How many times when you tell someone you are from Kingston do you get the immediate response: 'What, Jamaica?'?

The Great Eversden archaeologist, Prof Susan Oosthuizen, believes that Kingston was part of a much larger pre-Conquest royal estate in the Bourn Brook valley. The Domesday book of 1086 gives us more definite information: *in tempore Regis Edwardi* (in the time of King Edward the Confessor i.e, before 1066) the royal demesne in *Chingestone* consisted of one hide and three virgates; twenty years later this same estate remained in King William's hands.

Kingston has a second intimate connection with the monarchy which to this day combines the roles of Head of State with the Supreme Governorship of the Church of England. After a complex series of transfers in the early C15 Kingston's advowson (the right to nominate the incumbent of the benefice to the Diocesan bishop) was given to King Henry VI in 1456. He then gave it to the Provost and Fellows of his new foundation in Cambridge, the King's College of the Blessed Mary and St Nicholas. Rectors of Kingston were presented by King's College for the next four hundred and seventy years until 1926, when King's ceded their patronage to the Bishop of Ely. Nearly all of our Rectors during this era were fellows of the college. Until 1865 they were also Etonians, entry to King's being restricted to students of Eton: the two colleges were founded together as sisters by King Henry, following the example of William Wykeham's dual foundations of Winchester College and New College, Oxford.

Three Kingstonian Rectors were Provosts and three were Vice-Provosts of King's. Provosts were powerful men and well-rewarded: after the Reformation they were also permitted to marry, unlike fellows who were required to remain celibate.

(College livings such as Kingston were attractive to those inclined to matrimony and offered career opportunities: Kingston always remained a Rectory, with all the tithes and glebe retained by the incumbent of the benefice.) The election of Provosts was vested in the fellowship by statute, but they were invariably nominated by successive Tudor and Stuart monarchs until 1689. Visitors to the church will be familiar with the splendid Jacobean monument in the chancel to Dr Fogge Newton, Rector of Kingston 1602-12, Provost of King's 1610-12, and Vice-Chancellor of the University 1610-11. All together, five of the King's Rectors are buried in Kingston.

A Bolder Vision for the Future or the Beginning of the End

On the evening of 12 May the PCC (Parochial Church Council) hosted a community meeting to consider the future of Kingston Parish Church which was facilitated by the Revd Nigel di Castiglione, Team Rector of Papworth Team Ministry. The PCC has expressed concerns for the church going forward as attendance at worship services has decreased gradually over the years and more rapidly as might be predicted during and post COVID lockdown. While the church has benefited considerably from the generosity of the people of Kingston and beyond, there is a reality that those who have led the PCC for many years now need to step down, yet there does not seem to be interest within the community to take on the responsibility for the ongoing care of the church facility.

Kingston Parish Church is a Grade I listed building with beautiful painted murals of historical significance. [side note: the church is open everyday during daylight hours for viewing and just some peaceful time. If you haven't been to see it, I encourage you to stop in when you are out on a walk. All are welcome!].

A series of options for going forward were presented at the meeting including:


- Decide there is no future as an independent PCC and pursue partnership with another parish – sharing worship services but continuing to have other activities as possible in Kingston Church.
- Decide there is no future as an independent PCC and apply for status as a Festival church – the PCC could maintain some responsibility for the church – services would be reduced to approximately 6 per year including the 'festival' services of Easter, Christmas, Harvest, and at least 3 others. We would have the opportunity to expand the use of the church for other purposes such as concerts, lectures, non-religious festivals, art exhibitions, etc.
- Adopt a bolder vision for the church facility as a community resource: Recruit more involvement within the community and determine the uses that will increase the numbers attending activities in the church including those listed above as well as worship services perhaps a limited number as above or not. This option will require those in the village to not only make a commitment of finances as historically evidenced but also time to make the church an active part of village life. The possibilities might be interesting if the will exists.

The PCC is currently writing grants and fundraising to make needed repairs to the leaking roof on the south side of the church and nave ceiling which has fallen in. When those repairs are completed, the PCC has had discussions about possible improvements to the church to allow for more flexible use of the facility going forward. This would require further fundraising including grant writing in order to add toilet facilities and possibly even a small kitchenette.

While no decisions were made at the May meeting, those in attendance expressed a desire to keep the conversation going and to keep the church facility available as a resource to the community with worship being one use but expanding the uses to many other possibilities. It is clear that more voices need to be heard and more ideas need to be brought forward. Your PCC will be guided by the wishes of the village with regard to the way forward for Kingston Parish Church. It is your voice — or lack thereof — that will determine the direction taken. Watch this space as future ideas and options are shared.

Dressed as 'Coronation Maids' for the Coronation of H M the Queen, the 2nd June 1952: Win Curtis, Emily Wayman and Betty Wayman at number 3 Crane's Lane. The ceremony itself was watched in the School on a TV set (possibly the only one in the village at that date?) wired in especially from the School House next door. An elaborate programme of festivities on the day began with a United Service in the parish church and included competitive sports for children and adults; a cricket match between ladies and gentlemen; a parish tea; a fancy dress parade; evening entertainments of songs and two dramatic sketches; concluding with hymns and, from 9.15 to midnight, a dance in Mr Hagger's barn at Town Farm. Kingston knew how to party back in '52. *P.R.*
