Vicar's Letter

You may have come across the online game Wordle.

If you haven't, it consists of guessing a 5-letter word by putting in a series of your own words. Each time you put in a guess, the game shows you how close you are to the hidden word: the right letters in the right places are green, the right letters in the wrong places are yellow, and letters which don't belong there at all are grey.

There are 6 guesses available, and it usually takes me 4 of them to find each day's word, but my wife normally gets it in 3! If Wordle is too easy for you, there's Quordle where you have to solve 4 Wordles simultaneously. If words aren't your thing, there's Nerdle where you have to guess an arithmetic sum, and Worldle where you have to guess a country from its outline.

Because we humans live most of our lives with insufficient information. We are good at picking up clues, spotting patterns, filing in gaps from our experience and general knowledge, and drawing conclusions as best we can.

In the Gospels we see that Jesus' followers had the same issue: they heard what Jesus was saying, saw what he was doing, and tried to put that together with what they understood from their Bible. They had the clues and made their guesses as to who Jesus was and what he was doing. Some of their guesses were spot on, some were in the right direction, but in the 'wrong place'. Some they just got wrong: those ideas didn't belong with Jesus at all.

They struggled along, and at one point it seemed that they'd got everything wrong – Jesus was crucified, dead, and buried. But then they got the biggest and best clue of all: Resurrection!

Then gradually, one by one the 'letters' fell into place: Jesus was God, come to be one of us, and his purpose was to give us all a way back to God, forgiven and accepted.

If there are things in your life just now which feel as if they don't belong, or as if they're in the wrong places, don't despair. Put Jesus in the right place, at the heart of your life, and then you'll be able to juggle or discard the other 'letters' as much and often as you like, letting God lead you to better and better 'answers'.

Centuries Of History On The A428

Since July 2021, archaeologists from the Museum of London Archaeology (MOLA) and the Cambridge Archaeology Unit, have been excavating on the proposed A428 Black Cat to Caxton Gibbet Improvement Scheme.

At a site known as Field 44 near the village of Tempsford the team has uncovered evidence of an ancient farmstead, in use over a 700-year period from the Middle Iron Age (c.300-100 BC) through to the late Roman period (AD 201-400).

Even before that, people were visiting the area. Although no evidence of where they lived has been found, flint arrow heads have been found dating back to the Neolithic (c. 4000-2200 BC) and Bronze Age (c.2600-700 BC.

The first evidence of a settlement is two large round houses from the Middle Iron Age. Each more than 15 metres in diameter, they contained evidence that people

both lived and worked in them, including pottery, loom weights and personal dress items, including a ring headed pin.

After the Roman conquest in AD 43 the settlement continued to be occupied for around 400 years, with an oven used to dry grains and make malt for brewing, and querns for grinding grains. Goods were produced and traded. A Roman pottery kiln and imported goods such as fine Samian tableware and amphorae show the growing wealth and importance of the settlement.

As excavations continue more will be revealed about the site and those who lived there. The story of Field 44 is only just beginning.

Planning For Biodiversity

New planning guidance about better ways of protecting and enhancing biodiversity when development takes place have been adopted by the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Service in a Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) which must be considered and applied in planning decisions, alongside other existing considerations.

It means that 100% of all new homes should have an integrated nest box for species such as swifts, 25% of new homes on housing developments will need to include bat boxes, fences will need to feature gaps for hedgehogs and other species to roam more freely, green roofs will be encouraged to create valuable habitats of flowering

plants and grasses for wildlife and a reduction in artificial lighting which harms nocturnal species will be required.

Infrastructure for Kingston: County Broadband at work

Everyone in Kingston should have received letters from County Broadband ('CB') recently regarding the work they intend to do to bring another broadband offering into the local area. At the moment we do have "fibre to the premises" ('FTTP') broadband throughout most of the village, also known as "real fibre" or "ultrafast broadband", but a few outlying locations unfortunately missed out during the Connecting Cambridgeshire project of a few years ago. We are pushing CB to make sure their new service will have wider coverage. Currently, there are several providers of FTTP available to Kingston, but they all use the existing Openreach cabling and infrastructure. CB will be installing their own infrastructure, so they will be able to offer a completely separate rival service. Most of the work that CB are planning does not require parish council permission or input, so our powers are limited, but they are saying the right things about wanting to work with the local community, and we are doing what we can to get more detailed information.

Your Parish Council has had two recent meetings with CB about this, one on Zoom with the Project Manager, and one on site in Kingston with the Build Manager. I learned a lot from these and it was particularly interesting to look over the shoulder of the Build Manager as he was assessing their preferred cabling route while on location. Ideally, CB would seek to use as far as possible existing BT poles to carry their cables, but many of the poles along Church Lane were found to be "condemned" (ie in need of replacement at some unknown future date by BT) and not suitable to carry additional cabling. Common reasons for this were: the pole leans at too much of an angle, or the cables hang too close to existing electricity power wires. In those cases CB might seek to change the routing and use Power Network poles instead, or they might need to dig up the roads to lay the cables underground. My sense is that they now need to do quite a lot of work to re-design their infrastructure, and they will need to gather a lot of additional permissions eg from the Highways Department and from BT and Power Networks to achieve this. We have requested copies of the detailed plans, so that we can see for ourselves exactly what is going to be done and where, and hopefully have a chance to give more feedback where appropriate. It was very useful for example to be able to alert them at this stage to the fact of Church Lane being a bus route for both school and service buses. Normally they would think of digging up the road as being a minor issue, and they would assume they would only need to close half of the carriageway. But being on site, the Build Manager could see for himself that the road is too narrow for that strategy. We also stressed the importance of liaising with the bus companies so that we don't suddenly and without prior warning lose our service

when bus drivers discover on the day that they can't actually drive through Kingston.

Another issue that we are discussing with them (and with input from village hall committee members) is the location of a cabinet that they want to install in Kingston. We are looking at how best to camouflage this (perhaps with a wooden surround) so that it does not stick out too much as another piece of urban street furniture. Current thinking is to locate this near the village hall, near the oil tank storage area and just off the edge of the car park so that it does not take up any parking space.

Given the amount of preparatory work they still have to do, it would seem unlikely to me that CB will meet their preferred timetable of carrying out the build through the village in March, but who can say for sure. We await further information with keen interest!

EAST WEST RAIL PROJECT – UPDATE

Work on the design and planning stage of the East West Rail project has continued over the past six months even though there has been little official communication from EWR. A programme of quarterly focus group meetings has now commenced which cover areas possibly affected by the project. These have been split into regional groups – Kingston belongs to the South Cambridgeshire West Region.

A representative from the parish council attended the first focus meeting earlier this month. We were advised that EWR is currently considering feedback from the non-statutory consultation period regarding the five possible route alignments they highlighted earlier. They received about 10,000 responses and these will be used to help design the next stages of the project.

The next part of the process will be the production of a report which, at that stage, will highlight the one preferred route alignment that they wish to proceed with. There will then be a statutory consultation period to consider this route and it will then move forward to the planning stage. We do not as yet have a date when this document will be issued, however, we will be monitoring the situation carefully and will provide an update as soon as we find out more.


Don't reply, open attachments or be harried by references to legal action or disconnection. Check directly with your supplier.

Always check the credentials of anyone who you engage to dispose of your waste. If it is to provide a skip or get rid of waste, always use a registered waste carrier. You can check the Waste Carriers register on the Environment Agency website at https://environment.data.gov.uk/public-register/view/search-waste-carriers-brokers. You can be fined up to £400 if your waste is found fly tipped by you or someone else.

Solar Together Scheme

SCDC is once again taking part in the Solar Together Cambridgeshire scheme in partnership with Cambridgeshire County Council. It is a group buying scheme for solar panels. 

Old photographs of Kingston, 7: Church Lane Cottages, 1928



Photograph from the Cambridge Antiquarian Society's Photographic Record

This view is of Church Lane, looking north from the churchyard to Elizabeth and Shingled Cottages. The latter was indeed roofed with wooden shingles at a later date but here is clearly pantiled, as it is now. (During recent building repairs, Eddie Steele found many old shingles.in the loft.) But who was the eponymous 'Elizabeth'? Both buildings are timber framed: Elizabeth is reckoned to be C18 and Shingled

later, about 1840. Both cottages were acquired by the Cambridgeshire Cottage Improvement Society, founded in 1938 (later renamed The Cambridgeshire Cottage Housing Society), and then sold into private ownership in 1994. Beyond is a cottage on the site of what is now Rose Hide House, which fell into dereliction and was demolished before the war. Finally, a barn belonging to North Farm is visible on the road side.
