

Vicar's Letter

'Coming home'

This has been the great cry over the summer as the Lionesses progressed to the World Cup Final in Sydney. Sadly, it was not to be.

Home is about the people we are close to, the experiences we have with them and the memories we share; more than the place in which these things happen. That's why home is so precious and important to many and (tragically) can be a chilling nightmare to others.

Just over 40 years ago I went to live in Scotland. Not only was the weather colder, the accents different but some of the turns of phrase took getting used to – for example someone would ask 'Where do you stay?' meaning 'where do you live?' The adjustment was that the place I 'stayed' was where our belongings were put down but where we 'lived' was about life with one another and others!

In the next few weeks some of the younger people in the village will be heading off to college or university and others starting secondary school. For parents this can be stressful as we wait to see how they settle down, whether they feel 'at home' because new friendships are made and enjoyed. Again, it is a lot about the people rather than the place.

I have the privilege of being invited into many homes – usually to talk about weddings, christenings, funerals and other similar matters. Occasionally I cross a threshold and feel immediately this is a cold place, an unhappy place and so on; not because of the surroundings but because of how relationships have been conducted there.

Jesus echoed the same idea of home being where the people we love and cherish have space and spend time in; when speaking about his Father's house, having many rooms with his promise to the disciples that 'where I am you may be also.' It is for this and other similar reasons people often think of a church as like a family and they leave Sunday by Sunday feeling better about the week to come because of the people they have spent time with, including God also!

The Lionesses are now home – with family and friends, just without the cup they so hoped to be carrying; because home is where we celebrate success, commiserate over losses, find comfort in failure, encourage one another to try again and bring out the best in one another.

Paul Clark was born and bred in Great Eversden. He served in the army from 1955 to 1959; when he came out he went back to work at 'the Atlas' with his father Frederick and his brother John. When he saw Prudy he was smitten at first sight: Paul would say ever after that she was his first and only love. During their two years courting it was Prudy who proposed three times; Paul wanted to wait to save up money. They were married in Cambridge in January 1961.

The Clarks' first home was a caravan at The Leetes in Little Eversden; then they came to 8 Crane's Lane where they were to live for very nearly sixty years. Prudy and Paul proceeded to have five children in close succession: Sandra, June, Sarah, Janet and Barry. In due course the family grew to include fourteen grand children and five great-grandchildren.

Prudy never lost her Norfolk accent and kept up with her brothers and sisters in that county. She was modest, affable and kind, but possessed a strong moral compass and could be firm. She was resilient, never complained. A tower of strength, Prudy's whole life was devoted to the welfare of her family. Without exception she defended and supported her children, no matter what their scrapes and misadventures. She was constantly busy in the home and for this reason perhaps not so well known in the village outside 'the Lane'. Prudy's culinary skills were legendary and she always presided over the Sunday roast.

After Paul's early retirement due to ill health, Prudy supplemented the family's income with cleaning work in the village. As the house and garden in Crane's Lane became too much for them, three years ago Prudy and Paul moved reluctantly to sheltered housing at Chapelfield Way in Sawston.

Prudence Clark of Sawston, formerly of Kingston, passed away peacefully on Saturday May 6th, 2023 (Coronation Day) in Addenbrooke's Hospital, aged 82 years. The beloved wife of Paul, she was a loving mother and grandmother and is sadly missed by all her family and friends. The funeral service took place on Friday, 26th May, at Cambridge City Crematorium, with the Revd Tony Miller presiding. The reading was taken from the Book of Proverbs, Chapter 3, verses 10-31: 'A perfect wife – who can find her? Her value is beyond that of diamonds and gold...'

Planes

Luton Airport Flight Path and Airspace Deployment (AD6) change

There's only a few weeks left before the AD6 Post Implementation Review (PIR) period ends on 22 September 2023. The CAA claimed it believes that this extension will provide a more representative data set for their review of how the airspace change has performed, including whether anticipated impacts and benefits in the original proposal and decision have been delivered. We know it has not, so we need to continue submitting reports on its effects on us.

Separating the airspace from Stansted flights for "safety" reasons is just part of the long term plan-all being done in different separate processes. This is the helicopter view: Luton airport has submitted a DCO application to government to increase its capacity from 18m to 32million passengers annually. Stansted is also planning to increase its capacity hence the separation of its airspace from Luton flights. The AD6 airspace design is flawed and is why airbraking is constantly used to bring flights down rapidly instead of gradually as is normal. Impacts therefore worse than LLA led us to believe. Hence a review is needed, supported by the data from reports we make.

Trains

East West Rail

The selected route is alignment 1 that winds its way from Cambourne (north) to Cambridge South Station via Highfields Caldecote. Following the announcement on 26th May, I attended a number of community group meetings with EWR to continue raising our case, and find out their solutions to mitigate the problems their original proposal would cause. I attended a high-level meeting with the Council Leader and Director of Planning, and EWR Chief Exec Beth West and Strategy Director Will Gallagher. Both EWR officials stated that the line would be taken under the A428 and Highfields, as well as under the B1046 between Toft and Comberton. The EWR

staff are using the consultation feedback to revise and reduce the embankments and viaducts along the route by up to 50%. The final proposal is expected to be ready for formal consultation around Spring 2024, and then submitted to the Government for a Development Consent Order (the planning permission to build it).

The Chancellor Jeremy Hunt's announcement of a £615 million Life Sciences package and the Cambridge 2040 plans for 250,000 additional houses announcement by Michael Gove, Levelling Up secretary shows the Government's growth plans for this area are going ahead. It is driving the EWR project to enable access to the Life Sciences hub in the Biomedical campus and other southern parts of the district. The Government did not discuss any of these plans with the Local Councils.

Cambridge South Station

A further £200 million has been allocated to the four-platform Cambridge South railway station at Cambridge Biomedical Campus. The fully accessible station is due to be completed by 2025 and is expected to welcome 1.8 million passengers a year.

Automobiles

GCP Making Connections: Bus Service Improvements & Sustainable Travel Zone
The GCP published the result of the Making Connections consultation. Find the full
report at https://bit.ly/GCPReportJun2023. There was overall support for the
proposed first step of improving bus services, and second step for active travel
(cycling/walking). Many as expected objected to the third step of introducing
Sustainable Travel Zone (STZ) in 2027/28 to reduce traffic levels in the City and raise
money to improve bus services. GCP Board discussed the report and is now
considering some core changes to the STZ proposal such as (i) peak hours only (ii)
50% discount for local SMEs (using vans/HGVs), (iii) 50 free days/year/registered car.
More discussions ongoing.

Bus Franchising

The Mayor of the Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) Dr Nik Johnson with his team are actively working on a Bus Service Improvement Plan (BSIP) to bring in bus franchising in about 12-18 months. The CPCA is working with the GCP in joined up way to improve bus services in the area.

C2C - Cambourne to Cambridge busway

Still very much in the picture as it is needed to deliver houses planned for Bourn Airfield. There is a significant Planning condition that only 500 houses can be built until it is fully available.

Other Local Issues

Housebuilding/Land Supply

Greater Cambridge has a 6.1 year future supply of housing land (2023-2028), higher

than the national threshold of 5 years. This makes our area safe from speculative applications. The Environment Agency is objecting to applications for Bourn Airfield and Waterbeach until the supplier Cambridge Water (CW) proves to them it can provide without causing deterioration, but their contribution is later in the period so not of significant effect.

Water Supply Consultation feedback

Water Resources East have published some feedback from their consultation. They are working with other organisations to help address the Cambridge Water supply needs prior to the Fens Reservoir being developed.


