#### Vicar's Letter: Where was God?

Social media has been full of discussion about whether the tilt of his head was a nudge from God that saved Donald Trump from the assassin's bullet on July 14<sup>th</sup>? Those who say NO are generally a mixture of those who tend to think there is no God and others who say they believe in God but see him as wholly detached from events and activities in the world— which is a version of Deism which was popular in the English thinkers of the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> century. Others, suggesting God was at work protecting Donald Trump in that moment, typically see him as some sort of messiah for the US today and this is evidence of a high calling on his life.

Christians are open to the idea God can and will intervene in this world's affairs but we see the more dramatic examples as occasional and verifiable only with hindsight. This is the way we have come to understand the great deliverance of Israelites from slavery in Egypt and the significance of Jesus life, death and resurrection. It intrigues me how often a religious slant is found in many news bulletins and profiles. It has come into feature articles about some high profile soccer players as they prepared for the Euros final. It is being tossed around as something that touches on one of the new government proposed pieces of legislation – intent on banning what is known as 'conversion therapy'. Despite our enhanced education and highly developed technologies, the people groups and cultures of the world have not managed to secure the 'death of God'. Of course, there is a danger that religious perspectives or lines of thought are only introduced or given airtime as and when they suit the more political or economic goals of those promoting them. A more positive spin is to realise human beings are innately spiritual; thus, to make room for the spiritual becomes an intrinsic element of human thinking and reflection – in looking at our successes, failures, impact and outcomes in a properly rounded way. In the next few weeks some will find more space to relax, take holiday and a break from the rhythm of regular commitments. Such times for me are an opportunity to read books I have bought or borrowed but not made the time to read since the last holiday! One I enjoyed recently is 'The reason for God: belief in an age of scepticism' by Timothy Keller. It is the fruit of responding to questions put to him as a pastor/minister with a huge congregation of younger adults, typically under 40 years old. If you're looking for something to make you think and are prepared to let your more spiritual side have room to breathe, I commend it!



#### VILLAGE GRASS CUTTING

We have sadly been advised that our current contractor who has looked after our grass cutting services in the village for many years has had to close. We are in the process of going out to tender to find an alternative company that will provide grass cutting services to the village and this may take a little time to finalise.

In the meantime, we have been very fortunate as several people from the village have volunteered to help keep areas of grass in the village tidy in the interim. We are very grateful to them all for their help.

We have managed to source a temporary contractor to cut the grass on the village greens and have also arranged to hire a lawnmower to cut the grass in the village play park to ensure it is accessible for children over the summer period.

We have unfortunately found it difficult to arrange for anyone to cut the grass verges in the village and some other areas in the parish, as this requires specialist equipment. We would like to ask everyone if they would be able to help by looking after the verges which adjoin their properties over the next few weeks until we have secured a new contractor who has the necessary machinery.

We would like to reassure everyone that we are working hard to find a replacement contractor and will provide updates on the topic using the parish magazine to keep everyone informed of our progress.

#### Concert 'The Galant Flute' June 21st

The sixth Harcamlow concert – the second of 2024 – was another outstanding success. This was a performance of four flute quartets, two by Mozart, one by François Devienne and one by Franz Danzi. These last two were revelations for an appreciative audience about forty strong in number. The genre, featuring violin, viola, cello and flute, was popular in the later C18 but perhaps not so well known today. 'The flute quartet straddles the baroque and classical period. It is an iridescent transitional phenomenon, playing with the leftovers of the baroque concerto, experimenting with emerging musical structures, and, above all, showcasing the virtuosic splendour and versatility of the flute.'

Rosie Bowker was the remarkable flautist, performing on a replica of an instrument made in Dresden in 1790. Rosie is much in demand as a freelance musician, playing for example in The Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment and The English Concert; she is also a founder member of Pocket Sinfonia, performing throughout Europe. Joanna Patrick played viola: she is an exceptional young musician specialising in the baroque, and plays with The Academy of Ancient Music, The BBC Symphony Orchestra, the London Symphony Orchestra and Ensemble Mozaïque. The quartet was completed with our own Gwen Owen Robinson on violin and Hartmut Kuhlmann on cello: they describe themselves as amateurs but are accomplished

musicians by any standards. We are very fortunate to have what can only be described as world-class music making in Kingston and we must record our gratitude once again to Hartmut and Gwen Owen for organising this concert.

Paul Wheeler gave the vote of thanks and said something that bears repeating: that it is a joy to listen to this wonderful music, so beautifully performed, in a time of conflict and division in so many parts of the world. But that this music was itself composed at a time when the world was just as troubled with war and strife; and so there is always hope.
