#### Vicar's Letter: Are we too busy?

There are times in our lives when sudden changes demand or give us the opportunity to change the pattern or rhythm of life – the birth of a child, sudden loss of employment, the eruption of health issues etc. Some feel very positive whereas others are more like the onset of an unwanted storm; reminding us in some things we have choices, whilst in others we don't but along the way there are often decisions that need to be made about how we deal with or react to what is happening.

What has become very clear to many of us is the way the world is now more of a global village; where what happens in another country very soon makes an impact here and now. We saw this with the pandemic, the impact of the war in Ukraine and the potential ripple effect of huge tensions in the Middle East. The temptation can be to run even faster to overcome the new obstacles to be faced or feel powerless and marooned in a sea of uncertainty.

I have been reminded recently of the Judaeo-Christian tradition of building a sabbath day into the rhythm of life; where one day in seven has a different agenda – time for family and friends, leaving regular work to one side, doing things that offer refreshment and rest, including worship. This was easier, probably, in days when most businesses were closed on a Sunday, which all changed with the relaxing of Sunday trading regulations a little over 30 years ago. An irony is that what was intended to inject greater freedom for most people has turned into a more relentless pattern of work and activities leaving us feeling more frazzled than ever!

That will only change if we take charge of our circumstances in a fresh way.

A light bulb moment for me was when I was working in the commercial sector. Over a number of years, I had become used to working very long hours which was proving unhelpful to family life and relationships. A sense of crisis persuaded me to try something different: I would work no more than a 10-hour day and leave it all behind on Friday evening until first thing Monday. Within weeks I was finding I felt better, life was easier at home and I was being more productive at work! The crisis proved creative and, somehow, I found a way to find a new route out of it and to a different rhythm.

You may have a similar story. Alternatively, this may be a trigger to do something sooner rather than later. As a Christian I know I can draw God into the mix of what is happening, seek wisdom and support, discovering things can turn out very differently from how they may feel when the dilemma first appears. One of the benefits from that period is I found it relatively easy as a clergyman to leave windows of time when the diary is not completely full of other meetings and such matters; so that, as and when stuff happens, I can find time to see someone unexpectedly, fit in a funeral or respond to a request for a Christening and the like. (Not that I have periods sitting around with nothing to do!) A decision to change the way I thought about what was important became a gift that has served me well for more than 3 decades since.

## ORCHARD TEA PARTY KINGSTON

#### Coffee pod recycling comes to Cambridgeshire Household Recycling Centres

Over 1 billion coffee pods are sold each year in the UK alone. Waste from these 'single-use' pods will lead to a huge environmental impact if not recycled properly in the UK and globally.

The new coffee pod bins at Milton and St Neots offer residents an environmentally friendly way to separately dispose of both aluminium and plastic coffee pods. Collected pods are shredded and cleaned of coffee. The shredded pods can be made into new products, while the coffee grounds are used to help create renewable energy and soil improver.

#### A nightingale sang in Cambourne ...

On a guided walk in May, a nightingale was spotted at Cambourne Nature reserve. Nightingale numbers have shown a steep decline, and they are now on the Red List of birds of Conservation Concern.

They are summer visitors with a preference for scrub habitat, of which there is an abundance at Cambourne. The reserve also provides habitat for other birds on the Red List including farmland specialists like yellowhammer and linnets, and species you might think of as common, but whose numbers are in serious decline, such as greenfinches, starlings and house sparrows.



# Cambridgeshire Community Foundation celebrates awarding £32 million in community grants on its 20th anniversary
