## **Vicar's Letter: 'I have a dream ...'**

One feature is common to all the awful conflicts and growing armed aggression in various parts of the world, a sense of entitlement that spills over into the assertion of rights. I am not suggesting there are injustices that should not be resisted and changes that are to be sought. However, at its worst entitlement shows itself in rampant greed, triggers the dishonouring of others and, in the extreme, results in very horrible abuses of power and influence. It is something that can begin in very small ways and poison relationships in many areas. Nevertheless, there is mileage in examining our own mindsets, inner thoughts and deepest desires or ambitions; because, unless recognised and tempered, any sense of unrestrained entitlement soon becomes ugly and damages the ones we want to admire and love.

Allied to this strain of human frailty is, often, the dialling down or abandonment of a commitment to serve others. When that happens, often only realised further down the line, a paucity of interdependence comes about which leaves many people vulnerable and isolated at points in their lives when they can't do everything for themselves. As part of my regular duties I see, however, many fine examples of self-sacrifice and people engaging in acts of kindness that are often unrecognised and not properly celebrated. Thank you for what you are doing.

We are now entering a season of elections – local and national; some will also take a keen interest in following those happening in other parts of the world. I admire many who offer themselves as candidates to serve in the political sphere. It is a tough calling. Elected officials and politicians can easily fall victim to an array of temptations; or find the 'party-system' makes it very difficult to serve according to commonly agreed definitions of right and wrong or deeply held values. I believe it is very important to pray for our politicians as well as using my opportunities to vote.

Martin-Luther King was famous for, among many things, his 'I have a dream' speech. His vision and leadership probably took him to an early death. The things I dream of become some of the fuel and focus for things I pray about. Currently they include the dream we will enter an era where the nation gets good and better government led by those we need - people of clear principle, willing to stand for what they believe as servants of their constituents rather than for personal gain, rather than the ones we may deserve!

At the heart of such dreams coming about is, for me, the longstanding Christian conviction that prayer works, and the results we live with after going to the polls are the fruit of the choices we have made individually and through the exercise of our democratic freedom. The time to assess the degree of selfishness or the prevalence of service shaping our thinking is now. Later, if some of the outcomes are not wholly what we would prefer it is important to play our part with integrity and perseverance; also ensuring any disappointment does not turn into a sickness of spirit that generates a new cycle of entitlement!

## Kingston to Cambridge without a Camel

*a walk to raise funds for a school in Kenya*

On Sunday 30 June, Rt Revd Dr Graham Kings (an Hon. Assistant Bishop in Ely diocese) will lead an eight mile walk from Kingston to Selwyn College, Cambridge, along with Faith Galgalo, a 25-year-old civil servant in Nairobi, Kenya, whose father, Joseph Galgalo, co-led the 'Oxford to Cambridge with a Camel' walk, 25 years ago in 1999 which also included Kingston. Cleo, the camel, came from Amazing Animals, north of Oxford. £50,000 was raised then for camel-based nomad schools in northern Kenya, where Joseph grew up and was a primary school teacher at Bubisa.

ITV and BBC covered the event and a 6-minute film, edited by the Church Mission Society (CMS, founded in 1799), broadcast on YouTube (for background to the history of the walk and the vision carried forward now, see here:

25 years later, **this year's walk will raise money to go towards food to allow the children to remain in Bubisa school.** For four years up to 2023, there was a devastating drought in northern Kenya and Bubisa families have lost most of their camels. The walk is free, brunch at Selwyn College is £13.

There will be an open meeting on **Wednesday 22 May in Kingston Church at 7.30pm** for anyone who is interested in supporting this initiative.

Please do consider supporting the walk – in person, through donations and through prayer. **To join the walk on 30 June please come to All Saints & St Andrew's Church, Kingston, CB23 3NG, at 9.30am** for a short commissioning service, ready to leave at 10.00am and arrive at Selwyn in time for brunch at 1.00pm. **You can also donate at the Team Service on 30 June at 11am at Eltisley Church.**

## Report Remove

**Report Remove helps young people under 18 in the UK to confidentially report sexual images and videos of themselves and remove them from the internet.**

**Having your nudes shared can feel scary, and it can leave you feeling worried or even ashamed. But it's not your fault. It's against the law for anyone to share a sexual image or video of someone who's under 18, and Childline is working with the Internet Watch Foundation (IWF) and Yoti to help you remove any sexual image or video of you that's online.**

The NSPCC's Childline service ensures that the young person is safeguarded throughout the process and the IWF assesses the images. Young people aged 13+ can choose to prove their age using the age verification app Yoti, to help get the content removed from even more places. They will need some ID if they want to do this.

Young people will need to log into or create a Childline account so they can receive updates on their report, which allows them to be safeguarded and supported throughout the process. They are then taken to a dedicated IWF portal where they can securely upload images, videos or URLs (website addresses.)

Our IWF analysts assess the reported content and take action if it meets the threshold of illegality. The content is given a unique digital fingerprint (a hash) which is then shared with internet companies to help prevent the imagery from being uploaded or redistributed online.

Childline will then contact the young person via their Childline account to keep them updated and offer further support.

This can all be done entirely online. The young person does not need to tell anyone who they are (their ID is not linked to their report), they can make the report at any time, and further information and support is always available from the Childline website.

## **Bourn Surgery Announces a Time of Change**

2024 is a year of significant change at Bourn, with the retirement of Tracey Wilson, our Practice Manager, at the end of April, and Dr Mike Redwood, senior partner, at the end of June.

Dr Redwood has been a partner at Bourn Surgery for the last 31 years. He still plans to be involved in Bourn, doing locums, or helping out with teaching.

He became a partner at Bourn in the summer of 1993, replacing the much-respected Dr David Marsden when he retired.

Over the years there have been many changes in the NHS (some good, some not so good). The number of patients here has risen from about 4,500 to over 6,500, leading to challenges in providing the highest care within the confines of NHS restrictions.

Dr Redwood has been a GP Trainer, helping a large number of doctors become successful GPs (44 at the last count). Many of these are now GPs at local surgeries, including Bourn Surgery.

Bourn Surgery has developed a very high reputation around Cambridge, amongst other surgeries, at Addenbrooke's Hospital, and by bodies like the CCG (now "ICB").

Dr Redwood writes: "I will very much miss all the wonderful staff at the surgery, my fantastic patients, and of course my colleagues. I wish you and them all the best in the future and hope I will get the chance to meet some of you again over the next few years."

Tracey Wilson has spent a lifetime in the NHS, starting in Papworth Hospital as a Pharmacy Technician, then as Practice Manager at Bourn since 1991. She has helped manage our practice through umpteen NHS organisational changes, two floods, multiple building extensions and the computerisation and digitisation of general practice. She has done all of this with a kindness and compassion that has touched all of those she has met. Tracey has a heart of gold and has given her all to Bourn Surgery.

Tracey is retiring on 24 April. Emma Britton, our current deputy Practice Manager, will take over Tracey's role on her retirement.
