Vicar's Letter: Nothing is new yet much keeps changing!

Having just dismantled some fitted furniture items I am struck by how 'dated' it seemed – in terms of design, materials used and the finished look. At the same time, I am conscious of how some ways and means used by my parents' generation are now very much in vogue again! A big difference over the past half century is that whereas former generations would save up until they could buy a new item (or sometimes use Hire Purchase for the occasional one-off expected to last a lifetime), the advent of credit cards and associated debt management has made things much more accessible readily and immediately. On the one hand there is 'nothing new under the sun' and in the same breath the human race is achieving so much more than we imagined possible even just a few years ago. Alongside so much change and reinventing of old ways is the proper push to recycle as much of what we discard as possible in the interests of safeguarding the planet and the needs of future generations.

These things are replicated in spiritual matters. Attendance at cathedrals is on the up, many more people are happy to identify as 'spiritual' even if they are not followers of any particular denomination or creed; whilst locally we are working hard to see if our old buildings can be altered sensitively and affordably - to meet the expectations for old familiar forms of Christian worship to flourish, encouraging the new and, where we can, provide a greater and more comfortable use of the spaces we have in our care.

One matter that struck me recently is the way society views the place and importance of children. I was looking at a passage in the Bible where adults wanted to prevent children from getting close to Jesus; because culturally, in first century Israel, children were without power and status generally and thus were to be "seen but (preferably) not heard". Jesus rebukes those holding back the children and in so doing seems much closer to our western 21st century worldview. This is a positive outcome, I believe, and also helps us to project the relevance of Jesus today.

The deep-seated hostility and widespread bloodshed in both the Middle East as well as in the conflict between Russia and Ukraine, with rising tensions in the Far East over Taiwan ... to name a few ... is surely a reminder that where battles in one generation are ended without forgiveness and reconciliation they will, inevitably, ignite again and again – so that nothing is new except the nature of the weapons deployed and the speed with which news reaches the watching world.

On this point the church needs to look at itself. Within living memory there have been bitterly fought debates about the role of women, divorce and remarriage and currently proposals to allow same-sex marriages to be celebrated in church. What is unchanged is how the divisions arise from the way people read and interpret the place of the Bible in these matters. Until that is resolved, allied to much forgiveness and whole-hearted reconciliation, we must expect divisions and fallouts to be an ongoing and unchanged feature of our landscape



'All Day' Concessionary Bus Pass Travel Gets Green Light

The Combined Authority Board has approved plans to make all-day travel free for those who hold a Concessionary Bus Pass, set to take effect in May 2025. Currently, concessionary bus pass holders in the region are only permitted free travel during off-peak hours, starting at 9.30am on weekdays. With these new plans, pass holders

will be able to use their passes for free travel at all hours, providing them with greater flexibility.

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Hedgerows

Hedgerows are good habitat for wildlife, providing shelter, corridors, and food. If you need to cut back a hedge, please leave it until the berries have been eaten. Winter migrants like redwings and fieldfares feast on them! Here are some of the berries you might find in hedges at this time of year. Please admire the autumn fruits but don't forage.

- Hawthorn: there are two types of hawthorn. The less common midland hawthorn, found in some of our woods has berries that look the same but have 2 seeds per fruit.
- Rose: large, deep red, ovoid berries, on thorny stems
- Black bryony: large, shiny, bright red, spherical berries on a climber
- Sloes: single purple/blue berries often with a matt coating
- Ivv: its clusters of green berries ripening to black are important as a food source in the winter.

London Haydn Quartet Concert

On Friday, September 27, an appreciative audience was treated to the final concert in the 2023-2024 series presented by Harcamlow Music in the All Saints and St Andrews Church, Kingston. As always, this concert did not disappoint. The London Haydn Quartet; comprised of Catherine Manson on violin (and leader of the group), Michael Gurevich also on violin, John Crockatt on viola, and Alice Neary on cello; brought a masterfully performed and thoughtfully selected trio of musical pieces. The first composed by Johann Jakob Froberger and arranged by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart was Phantasia supra Ut, Re,mi fa sol la. The second Joseph Haydn's String Quartet op 33 no. 5 G major. The final Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's own String Quartet no.16 K 428 E flat major. If you know this music, you know how special this was; if not, you don't know what you missed as the lovely blend of sound floated and wrapped those in attendance. As those who have experienced these events in our church have learned, the gift shared by these talented musicians is always enhanced by the acoustical gift of our lovely Kingston Parish Church.

We, in Kingston, are lucky to have Harcamlow Music based in our community and the Kingston PCC wishes to thank them for bringing their concerts to our church. Our local bus services - public consultation

Local bus services in Cambridgeshire are struggling.

As a representative of Kingston Parish Council I recently attended a meeting organised by the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) to discuss the way forward. The blunt message was: the current way of doing things cannot continue. (The current way is for public transport to be run by private operators, with subsidies from the County Council to support services that are not commercially viable. Much of the money to pay for this comes from a 'mayoral precept' added to our council tax bills, as well as a 'transport levy' paid by local authorities.) It is felt that this framework is not conducive to creating an integrated transport network, and that currently the CPCA has no control, and very little influence, over the routes the bus operators choose to run.

There are two options currently being evaluated. A comparison of the 'strategic case', 'economic case', 'commercial case', 'financial case' and 'managerial case' for each option has been carried out by the CPCA and independently audited. These options are:

- Extended partnership (similar to the present system, but with negotiation for more input/influence from the CPCA)
- Franchising (the CPCA would control all services, and determine routes, frequencies, fares and service standards)

I was very encouraged to see that the Managing Director of Stagecoach East was in the audience for the meeting I attended. Clearly he recognises that changes need to be made and it is in his company's interests to be part of the process. He is working closely with the CPCA to put together a viable framework for future operations.

"Rural connectivity" was the buzz phrase at this meeting, and there were many parish councillors present, all like me pushing to get improved services for our villages. This is a lot harder to put in place than to look after services in the cities, so it is important that we keep this front and centre in the minds of the transport planners as they work on strategy for the future.

The impression I got from the meeting was that the CPCA would prefer the franchising model, as this gives more local control over transport services. But it is financially riskier, so they need to be sure they have support from the local community before committing to this.

A public consultation is underway to elicit views from interested organisations like parish councils and businesses, as well as individual members of the public. The deadline for responses is 20th November 2024. More explanation about the consultation, and background information on the options under consideration, can be found online here https://cpca-yourvoice.co.uk/bus-franchising-consultation/ where a copy of the consultation document can be downloaded in pdf format. The consultation is focussed on the choices to be made rather than the state of the bus services in general, so most of the questions refer back to the consultation document for a response. However, there is no need to answer all of the questions, and there is scope in question 1 and question 10 to remind the CPCA of what we need locally "Q1 Do you have any comments generally on how well bus services are currently performing in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough?" and "Q10 Do you have any further comments?"

I encourage everyone to have their say. Please do contact me if you want to discuss this further or need more information. I am also pleased at any time to gather details of your experiences with our local bus, separately from the consultation exercise.
