#### Vicar's Letter: Things we never knew?

One of my responsibilities involves the care and upkeep of 16 churchyards associated with the 15 parishes in the Papworth Team Ministry. There is often quite a bit of confusion about what is allowed. Here are some details that you may not be aware of!

- 1. Being buried in a churchyard does not mean the family thereafter own that piece of land. Fees paid to the PCC at the time of a burial are a one-off contribution towards the work involved in the burial and for a small part of the general maintenance of the whole churchyard.
- 2. Permission must be sought for the erection or installation of any Memorial.
- 3. Individual tombstones remain primarily the responsibility of those who have them erected, and after their demise of the heirs-at -law of those commemorated; but the PCC is responsible for checking whether a stone becomes unsafe and initiate action to protect from injury.
- 4. There are rules around the size, material used, and the inscriptions allowed on a memorial that I have some delegated authority to approve. That a style of memorial or type of stone was used in times past is not a reason to allow replicas today.
- 5. The general scattering of cremated remains in a churchyard (rather than the burial of them in particular plot) is not allowed.
- 6. Artificial flowers are not allowed, except for Remembrance Day poppies and Christmas wreaths which must be removed within 2 months. Likewise, artificial grass on a burial plot is not permitted.
- 7. Trees and shrubs may not be planted in a churchyard without separate permission. Similarly, an array of other memorial artefacts personal to particular families are very often inappropriate in a churchyard and can be removed.
- 8. Whilst there may be older kerbstones (and older often impressive headstones) in a churchyard, new kerbstones are no longer allowed. The reason is once immediate relatives leave the area or die themselves, the burden of tending graves falls on other volunteers and the task of the church in keeping an area of largely grass mowed is more straightforward if there are no kerbs.
- 9. Any memorial whether of a full burial or of cremated remains can only refer to the person(s) actually buried in that place.
- 10. Being buried in a churchyard cannot be guaranteed even if the deceased has included that preference in their will, although we always try to do our best at such times; but in the end the allocation of burial plots is down to the Rector.

These things are very important, especially for the relatives of those who have been buried or whose cremated remains have been laid to rest in a churchyard. The aim is to try to serve: the needs of a family bereaved of a loved one; whilst acknowledging

the needs of others who will have loved ones buried nearby, of the church on whom the upkeep falls, and on the needs of generations to come who will want to find the place of burial and a memorial often decades later. #### Delivery of new chalice and paten 21st September

Readers will remember that our Elizabethan silver chalice and paten were stolen at the end of September in 2022. Despite an appeal in the local press, supported by Cambridge Constabulary, it was obvious that the recovery of the church plate would be most unlikely. Parochial Church Council members therefore resolved to commission replacements and, after discussion, it was agreed that these should not be replicas of the C16 but contemporary pieces.

Torrie Smith, himself a silversmith, consulted his friend Jane Singleton, a local silver expert, in the first instance to ascertain the value of the stolen items. This led to Jane suggesting to Torrie that the PCC might contact the Bishopsland Educational Trust, an internationally recognised charity devoted to training and education in the craft of silversmithing, based near Reading. The thinking was that young postgraduate silversmiths would welcome a commission of this nature, and also that their prices would be significantly lower than any well-established designers.

Torrie then exchanged emails with the Executive Director of Bishopsland, Claire Murdoch, who recommended two of her students, Jonny Stokes and Alewijn Slingerland. To cut a long story short, Alewijn and Jonny came to Kingston in May last year to discuss the project with representatives of the PCC. After a lengthy correspondence, our insurers, Ecclesiastical Insurance, authorised the quotation for the new vessels and the PCC was able to approve Jonny and Alewijn's design in September 2023.

A year later, on the 21<sup>st</sup> September, Alewijn came up from London to deliver the new silver, and the PCC invited parishioners to a celebratory reception in the church

with refreshments. This was a truly historic occasion in the annals of Kingston.

The finished communion vessels are stunning and exceed our expectations. Both chalice and paten are simple and elegant in shape. The paten, which is used for the distribution of communion wafers, is embossed with a ring on its underside so that it forms a lid for the chalice. Closer inspection of the chalice reveals a sophisticated asymmetry of facets; the highly polished finish reflects the light. Jonny and Alewijn's design was made initially by conventional pencil drawings,

but the use of CAD rendering made it possible to model in three dimensions on a computer and then to produce accurate templates. The chalice was made in two parts: the bowl from a single sheet of silver hammered into shape, and the base from twelve individual panels soldered together. The bowl has been lined with gold plate, a protective measure as well as a decorative finish. The craftsmanship is superb and represents many hours of work, a labour of love.

Both the chalice and paten have seven hall marks: the so-called sponsor's marks of the two makers, Alewijn and Jonny; the traditional lion passant symbol confirming the items to be sterling silver; the millesimal fineness mark, in this case 925, indicating the precious metal content in parts per thousand; the Assay Office Mark, here the leopard's head for London; the date letter mark, lower case z for 2024; and, finally, the special commemorative mark, the head in profile of King Charles III, celebrating his coronation, authorised for use until the end of this year.

We are greatly indebted to the two silversmiths, Jonny Stokes and Alewijn Slingerland, and congratulate them on the successful conclusion of this project. Our Elizabethan chalice and paten were in continuous use here in Kingston, celebrating the Eucharist, which we believe was ordained by Jesus Christ himself, from 1570 to 2022, slightly more than 450 years. What of the next 450 years? That is up to us and to our descendants in this place. The future is always unknowable and uncertain, but commissioning this new silverware is an act of faith and confidence in that unknown quantity. We live in time but also in the eternal; our calling is to redeem

the time allotted to us. We invite everyone in Kingston – of all faiths or none – to join us on Christmas Eve when the new silver vessels will be blessed and used for the first time. Our Archdeacon, the Venerable Alex Hughes, is booked to take this service.

#### **Parish Council Update**

We are starting to plan the parish council budget for next year and wanted to advise everyone of three items that could increase in cost considerably over the next financial year:-

- 1. Grass cutting and maintenance for the village. We are currently involved in a tendering process and are working hard to secure a competitive quotation. We have had a wide range of quotations and even though it looks as if we will be able to secure a very competitive final contract this will result in an increase from costs in previous years.
- 2. Increased street lighting costs on side roads within the village there are indications that the cost of street lighting could increase fourfold, but we are awaiting confirmation of the new charges which will take effect in October 2024. The street lights in question are those located on side roads within the village these are not the street lights on main roads running through the village as these are the responsibility of the County Council.
- 3. Clerk's salary costs— as we have struggled to fill the role of Parish Clerk locally, we are now looking to employ a professional parish clerk who would be employed on a part time basis. This could result in an increase in salary costs next year. We are currently in the process of placing an advertisment with the organisation representing parish clerks nationally. If, in the meantime, there is anyone who knows of a person who might be interested in the role please contact clerk@kingstonvillage.org.uk for further details.

We would like to re-assure everyone that we are working hard to try and keep any increase in cost as low as possible. We will provide further updates via the parish magazine.


Complementing this wonderful event the evocative Fen photographs of Torrie Smith together with the art of Simon Draper will be on display in the hall.
